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NYWEA Launches Video and Companion Guide to Increase Public Awareness about Importance of Water Quality Infrastructure

Syracuse -- Do you know what happens after flushing a toilet? Why should you know or even care? **New York Water Environment Association (NYWEA)** industry experts believe that it is critically important everyone is aware of the work and investment necessary to maintain water quality, protect public health and support New York State's economy.
